EDITORIAL.

This journal covers the period from February, 1962, to March 9th, 1963-Founder's Day, when the finals of the Athletics Sports, the last item in the Inter-House Competitions, were held and Fury became the Champion House.

On the academic side results were highly satisfactory. Our 15 F.Sc. Second Year candidates all passed, with 7 1st Divisions, 7 2nd Divisions and only 1 3rd Division. Our 11 First Year candidates followed their example. In the Matriculation we had 12 candidates, of whom 10 secured 1st Divisions and the other 2 high 2nd Divisions. The most remarkable feature of the result was that no less than 33% secured Government Scholarships. Two candidates out of 30 failed in the Senior Cambridge Examination—a very satisfactory result considering the comparatively high standard of this examination and the comparatively low age of our candidates.

The number of boys who joined the P. A. F. College, Risalpur, during the year was 24—our highest ever. Moreover, an ex-Sargodhian—Nasir Mahmud Butt—won the Sword of Honour at the Passing Out Parade in January, 1963, and another seems likely to win it in June. The Sword of Honour at the P. M. A., Kakul, was also won by an ex-Sargodhian—Fazl-e-Qadir—at the Passing Out Parade in April, 1962, when ex-Sargodhians distinguished themselves by taking the first three places.

In Sports the highlights of the year were the winning of the W. Pakistan Junior Athletics Championship at Lahore, and the C. T. I. Basketball Tournament at Sialkot.

The record number of 31 boys gained their 'Wings' at gliding during the year. Aero-modelling, in spite of a shortage of models, continued to flourish and we were able to repeat our previous year's display on Founder's Day on a more ambitious scale.

We welcome back Mr. Nasir Chaudhry from the U. K., where he distinguished himself by topping his course for the Certificate of Education at Nottingham University. Mr. Rehman Qureshi is at present undertaking the same course at Southampton University and we are sure he will likewise enhance his own and the School's reputation. We owe a debt of gratitude to the British Council, whose generosity made it possible for these two members of the Staff to proceed on these courses.

Perhaps the most noteworthy improvement of the year was to be seen in the School Library, where Mr. Shafqat's untiring efforts have borne excellent results, and the Library is now more in keeping with the standard of a Public School than was once the case.

For the information contained in this journal we are greatly indebted to Hasan Pervez, the School Head Boy, and those who have assisted him in producing the School News Sheet, which is a faithful weekly record of the School's activities.

Although we did not manage to maintain our previous year's 100% pass record, the result was nevertheless highly satisfactory, especially considering that nearly half the candidates had been at the School for only just over three years. Of the 30 candidates, 27 passed, one gained a G. C. E., and 2 failed.

There were no failures in English Language, Mathematics, Bengali and Higher Urdu. Two candidates-Abdul Mannan and Shahid Aziz-obtained Distinctions in English Language-a rare feat. Abdul Rauf, Ahmad Saeed and Imtiaz Ali Rastgar gained Distinctions in Urdu; while Abdul Muquet gained a Distinction in General Science. Aliuddin and Abdul Mannan topped the list with 19 points each.

More important than the mere number, however, is the fact that Sargodhians have been faring remarkably well at the College both in the Entry Tests and Terminal Tests. Najmi (243-F) topped the 37th Entry, while Safi and Maqsood topped the list of the 38th Entry, in which Sargodhians occupied 8 of the first 11 places. In the 39th Entry Test, Saeed Anwar, Nazimullah and Waheed Iqbal took the first 3 places and 5 Sargodhians were in the first 7 places.

The outstanding achievement of the year, of course, was that of Nasir Mahmood Butt (207T), who won not only the Sword of Honour but also the Flying Trophy and Ground Subjects Trophy at the Passing Out Parade of the 35th Course, in January, 1963. When he passed out, Waleed, who had topped his Course, took over as Wing Under-Officer and is thus likely to become the next Sword of Honour winner Akmal, who has done exceptionally well at flying, became a Senior Under-Officer and is expected to win the Flying Trophy. Safi distinguished himself by being the only Cadet of his Course to obtain Grade 8 in the terminal test at Risalpur in December, 1962, Maqsood taking second place.

During the course of the year four Sargodhians were sent to the U.S.A for training, viz Shafiq Haider, Riaz Choudhry, Shahid Raza and Shaukat Khalil; while Hasan Varis proceeded to the R. A. F. College, Cranwell, U. K.

THE ROYAL AIR FORCE COLLEGE, CRANWELL.

It was on the 8th of January, 1961, at about 1800 hours, that our P.I.A. Boeing 707 touched down at London Airport. Two days later I was starting the first day of a 3 year training course at the R.A.F. College, Cranwell.

To the Royal Air Force, Cranwell is what Risalpur is to our Air Force. It provides the R.A.F. with the cream of the nation's youth. Look back into the R.A.F. history and you will see that many aces first learned to fly at this College. The inventor of the jet engine, Sir Frank Whittle, and the famous Douglas Bader, who flew combat sorties with artificial legs, were both ex-Cranwell cadets. There are countless others. It is by producing such famous men that Cranwell has earned for itself a leading place in the World's Air Universities.

The College was founded in 1920, but it was a very small affair. Later on, however, in 1934 when the significance of Air Power was beginning to dawn, Cranwell underwent a major expansion programme. Two vast messes were constructed, the airfield was paved, and a full flying and academics syllabus was introduced. During the Second World War the College was temporarily shut down, the airfield being used to train flyers at top speed. However, in 1946, normal training was resumed. The following year, the King's Colour was bestowed on the College. The colour is awarded only to the best units and Cranwell was the first in the R.A.F. to get it.

The training at Cranwell is spread over three years. During the first, one concentrates mainly on academics, but a little bit of flying (in D.H. Chipmunks) is thrown in to keep up one's interest in aviation. The last two years are devoted mainly to flying training (in Jet Provosts) and to officer training. The aim here at Cranwell is to produce not only good pilots but also excellent officers. On graduating successfully from here, one gets a permanent commission in the Service.

I have been here for over two years now and it has been a wonderful experience. No doubt I have learned a great deal. I have formed the impression that the flying training here is of the same standard as that at Risalpur, but the officer training is vastly superior. Every cadet at Cranwell is given ample time and opportunity to exercise command and leadership of men. All of us have to go through a 15 day survival course and various other tactical exercises which test a man's endurance to the maximum. We spend a great deal of time in learning how the Air Force is run and how an operational station is administered. The training is intensive and so it should be. In any peace-time air arm, it is officers that can undertake various jobs that are required more than pilots with great flying skill only.




Pervez Iqbal, under training at the R.A.F. College, Cranwell, U. K.

I am certain that the P.A.F. will continue its present policy of sending its cadets to Cranwell, and I am sure that we are going to see a lot more ex-Sargodhian faces around here in the future.

Since we last drew the curtain across our life for the year 1961, 'Fury' has witnessed a number of changes and and among them, of course, the human change comes first. A school is a two-way traffic stream where boys make 'their exits and entrances', and consequently, since last year, we have had to say good-bye to Iqbal Jawaid, Waheed Iqbal, Hamid Rauf, Iqtidar, Mashkoor, Amjad Qurban, Mohd Rafique, Saeed Sadiq, Saeed Anwar, Anis Fazal and last, but not the least, Salam. The names of new members of the 'Family' are given at the end of this report.

Among the other changes, we are indebted to the Principal for providing mosaic flooring in the House and giving us a new Radio set. We have, ourselves, spent a good bit from our pockets and improved the Radio Room a great deal. Credit is due to the boys for cutting a slice from their pocket money and to Ilyas for taking a keen interest in the improvement made.

As for other activities, we might say that history repeats itself and that in the case of Fury it has done so more than once. We have won the coveted Chigwell Shield for the best all-round performance for the fifth time since the Trophy was started in 1955. May we say, without conceit, that the number of times we have been champions is equal to all the other Houses put together. Well done Furious Furians of Fury, both old and present!

To give the story in detail, we fared better at Cricket this time since we improved our position from fourth to second. While in the seniors Azad turned out to be a new find as a bowler, in the Juniors Riaz, Azmat, Feroze and Saeed Afzal brought us

laurels and showed promise for the future.

At Indoor Games we surprised everyone by getting the first position. While Azad, the 'lucky captain', worked hard in the Seniors, Sajjad (Capt.) and Arshad were the school junior champions at Table Tennis and Chess respectively. The last two are outstandingly good players for their age.

We were first equal with Sabre at Basketball. We did lose one senior match; but it was not to an inferior team. Iftikhar, the 'Senior Junior' both in height and skill, and 'Bilal' among the Juniors played with outstanding spirit. Rauf, Masoom and Zia displayed skill of high degree.

Though we lost the Debating Cup, Iqbal and Pervez spoke extremely well and the latter brought us a feather in the cap the following term by being declared the best speaker at the Inter-Public School Debate held at Abbottabad.

In the following term, we had to remain contented with the third position at swimming as other Houses were lucky to have good swimmers like Quasem, Mehdi, Muqeet and Jasheem back in the F.Sc. Form, and we were also handicapped by having a very small 10th Entry which were the senior-most juniors. In fact we suffered from this handicap in all competitions. 'Arshid' (Capt.) once again, however, proved to be outstandingly good at diving.

Fury coming first with Sabre at Football was a shock to some as we had hardly a single skilful player. It was, however, again the Fury 'Kill Yourself' spirit which worked the miracle.

At Hockey we displayed both skill and spirit and had little difficulty in retaining the Trophy. Fury Seniors avenged their Football defeat at Hockey against Sabre with a convincing win by four goals. Though everyone played a dashing game, Riaz, Masoom, Sikandar, Zaka, Iftikhar and Azad were most prominent in the Seniors, while Ehsanullah (Capt.), Saeed Afzal, Kausar and Arshad excelled among the Juniors. Wahid set an example by playing at a place other than his choice in the interest of his House. Feroze, though only from the 12th Entry, is full of 'Fury Spirit' and has already established himself as the best all-round sportsman among the Juniors.

Losing the P. T. Cup by half a point to Attacker is a sore point with us as we had never lost the Trophy before and according to the general opinion our performance was head and shoulders above anyone else's.

Once again, we retained the 2nd position at Drill. Our general smartness and turn-out were again about the best and the Senior Flight was once again beaten by a very narrow margin.

Since we had lost our main athletes -Rauf, Iqtidar and Kaiser - this year we lost our cherished Athletics cup to Sabre, who certainly deserved it as they worked harder than we did and were also lucky to have Shafique back. Yasin's feat, however, of clearing 8 feet 5 inches in the Pole Vault at the age of 12½ years is certainly remarkable. Asghar (capt.), Arshad and Ehsanullah all showed considerable promise.

As a Public School aims at developing the 'whole man', body, mind and spirit, we have maintained a balance of the three and we are glad to say that our achievements at academics were no less than in other directions for we shared the Trophy with Sabre. Besides, our success at the University Examinations was conspicuous and we obtained the maximum points in each of the four Examinations. While Iqbal Jawaid as usual topped the F.Sc., Mannan was declared first in the Senior Cambridge and Abdul Qadeer Mansoor was top in the Matriculation. In the Ist Year F.Sc., too, our average was the best. Iqbal has now gone on an Inter-Wing Scholarship to East Pakistan. Among others, Afzal, Marghoob, Mushtaq, Pervez Akhtar and Fazlur Rehman continue to bring credit to Fury.

Thus our all-round achievements were such that we had a convincing lead of ten points over our nearest rivals, the Saberites. This is probably the biggest lead any House has ever had.

Little would have been achieved without sound leadership and proper discipline and I must say that our appointment holders have set as good an example as can be expected from boys of the difficult adolescent age. They have been leaders rather than 'slave drivers' as in some other Public Schools. We did not confine our activites to the School campus. Picnics to the Chenab, and Lyallpur, cycle picnics to the countryside, the major one to Kalar Kahar, and social nights have been a part of our otherwise busy existence.

In the School sphere, Hasan Pervez continued to do a very useful job as the News Sheet Chief Editor and is also the School Head Boy. Fury also secured the Gliding Trophy, four boys gaining Category 'C' and eight achieving 'B' categories. Rauf was the Basketball Captain in the first term, and Masoom became the Gymnastics Captain.

Never before in the history of Sabre House has so much success been achieved as during the year under review. We shared the first place in Academics and won four other trophies, this being the largest number won by any house this year and the first time Sabre House has won so many. We also shared the Gliding Trophy, and thus we achieved success in all the three important activities of this school—Academics,

Sports and Gliding. We moved up to the more respectable second place this year and the possibility of winning the Chigwell Shield no longer seems so remote.

We started the year with some set-backs. The Cricket trophy was lost because of the poor performance of the Juniors. The Seniors also played without their Captain, Shafiqul Haque, who was down with Chicken Pox. Bhatti, Yousaf and Inayat played well, while Haji Ehtesham and Idrees bowled effectively. Haroon's performance in the Juniors was creditable. The House managed to get the second position in this competition.

The Debating Competition caused general surprise because this time the traditional winners were beaten by Zakir and Nasir in the Seniors and Juniors both. With the help of Shafique (369) and Mansoor, our debating team won the trophy which had so far never been lost by Fury House since its inception in 1958.

Our weak Chess & Draughts teams let us down very badly in the Indoor Games Competition. Gulzar Bhatti became the School Champion in Table Tennis while Zakir and Shafique (335) also remained unbeaten. Mizan and Mahboob (469) also did well.

The Basketball team added yet another feather to our cap by winning the trophy. The Seniors remained unbeaten throughout the competition. Bhatti and Ehtesham delighted the spectators by their outstanding performance, while Haroon, Hayat and Mahboob (469) in the Junior team put up creditable performances. This was followed by our usual indifferent performance at swimming in which the traditional lack of interest of this House should be replaced by keener efforts. The number of non-swimmers was, however, small and gives us some hope for the future.

The second term began with a resounding victory in the Football Competition. The senior team captain, Shafique (335), did his job magnificently and scored most of the goals. The whole team played a spirited game, but special mention should be made of Ghani, Yousaf, and Saiful amongst the Seniors, and Mizan, Arman, and Jawaid Malik among the Juniors, who made it possible for the House to retain the Football trophy for the second year running. This success, however, was followed by a very disappointing performance in Hockey. This was perhaps due to insufficient practice as a large number of boys were on gliding training, making it impossible to have practice with the full team. Mizan, Mumtaz and Shahid (522) played well for the Juniors while Tiwana, Shafique (335), Daud and Solat tried hard for the Seniors. The discreditable positions in Marching, P.T. and Gymnastics were partly responsible for our not getting the Chigwell Shield. But the year ended on a happy note because we not only annexed the coveted Athletics Cup for the first time but we also shared the Academic and the Flying trophies. The boys who brought us credit in the

academic field were Syed Zakir Hassan, Nayyer Iqbal & G.D.A. Rehman Khan (scholarship in matric.), Mohd Inayatullah (2nd in Senior Cambridge), Quazi Mohd Abdul Malik, Syed Azhar Ali Bokhari, Jamal Ahmed Ansari, Shahid Mahmood, Javaid Iqbal, Mohd Mizanur Rehman, Mohd Arman Habib, Zillul Majid, Mushtaque Ahmed and Rashid Ahmed (660). In Gliding Shahid Kamal and Bokhari got Category 'C', while Idrees, Mansoor, Nasir and Shafique got their Category 'B'. The performance of Shafique (369), Haroon and Ikram in Gymnastics was creditable.

It may not be out of place to mention the performance of our athletes. Arman Habib (594), who stole the limelight by winning all his four events, was declared the School Best Junior Athlete, and he is also good at other games. Mizan, Zillul, and Javaid Malik also did well for the Juniors. Among the Seniors, Saiful was adjudged the second best athlete. He secured 18 points and was closely followed by Shafique (14 points). Haroon, Hayat and Tiwana also gave good performances in their events.

The natural talent for dramatics in Shafique (369) was very useful to the House and he was able to organise a number of social evenings and a Variety Programme. Members of the Staff, Prefects and other guests were invited. We were able to discover new dramatic talent, while the older ones gave more accomplished performances. Those who acted well and won the first three prizes were Shafique (369), Jamal and Zaki. Others who did quite well were Saiful, Nasir, Gomes, Kalim, Haroon, Mansoor and Bokhari. CHACHA CHAKKAN, a play by Shaukat Thanavi in series, has been adopted by a group of boys led by Jamal, who provide a very befitting cast for these series.

News of old Saberites is also very encouraging, and no matter to whichever field they have devoted themselves they have achieved distinction. Waleed is Wing Under-Officer at Risalpur. Shaukat Khalil has gone to U.S.A. for further training in flying. Mustafa and Nurul successfully completed their training at Risalpur, while Tariq Nazir Syed, Qazi Solat Javed and Bakht Bedar have been doing well in the flying training. Mahmood Nisar Ali Beg (166) has joined the P.M.A. and Saleem Yunus (242) has gone to Canada for higher studies.

The House has further improved in appearance and our enthusiastic Gardener is maintaining the front plot well.

An exceptionally small number of Seniors was the greatest handicap in both terms. When the boys left at the end of May, only eight Seniors were left and even with the promotion of the ninth entry in September, there were only 18 Seniors. It was often difficult to raise a Senior eleven and on some occasions Juniors had to be included to complete the team.

In spite of this unbalanced ratio between Seniors and Juniors, we were runnersup for the Chigwell Shield until the very end when Sabre, by winning the Athletics trophy, overtook us and we had to be content with the third position. To sum up, we were Champions in Boxing and Drill and runners-up in Debating, Hockey and Swimming. House reports have become lists of successes and failures on the games field in the Inter-House Tournaments and this is no exception. In Cricket the Seniors were very weak. The Juniors, however, won two out of three matches, Ataullah's bowling average was the best in the Juniors while Basit's batting average was second best. We had no chances in Basketball but in Debating we did much better and were runners-up, Jamal securing second position among the Juniors.

In the Indoor Games our Juniors proved the best but our Seniors were last and we had to be content with the third position. Sikandar and Jamal were the Senior and Junior Draughts Champions.

In Swimming we had bad luck, as we lost to Attacker, our old rivals, by a single point, the final score being 45-44. We had a strong Junior Football team, which not only remained unbeaten but set up a record of not allowing any team to score a single goal against it. Well done Ataullah, the custodian! But the Seniors were weak, which placed us third.

In Hockey our Senior team, under the able captaincy of Saeed (375), proved very strong and were the unbeaten champions. It was just bad luck that in the senior match against Fury, Basit scored a goal which was later disallowed by the referee, otherwise there would have been a different story to tell. Our Juniors were not very good and we had to be content with the runners-up position.

We were determined to get back the Boxing cup, which we lost last year on points, and we succeeded. Ozair and Irshad trained the team so efficiently that ten out of thirteen boxers reached the finals, while Ozair, Ilyas, Irshad, Tausif and Helal were the weight champions.

The House has been Drill Champions for the last three years and this year, too, our superiority was obvious and it was clear even before the event that the other Houses were competing for the second, third and fourth positions. Both our Senior and Junior flights were declared the best in the Competition. On Founder's Day our Junior flight was declared the best flight by the Commander-in-Chief, who was the Guest of Honour, and the Principal was kind enough to send the whole flight for a picture at his expense. Ozair was the Senior flight Commander, while the Junior flight was commanded by Jasheem and Muquet in turn.

In Athletics we were nowhere. Ožair and Shafiq pulled muscles and some sure events were thus lost. Wasim set up a new School record in the 80 metres Juniors Hurdles.

All candidates, except one, who appeared for the different Public Examinations were declared successful. Five appeared for the F Sc and all passed, two securing First Divisions. The four who appeared for the 1st Year Examination all passed, and Safi (356) stood first among the School candidates. In the Senior Cambridge four out of six who secured First Division were Tempestians. In the Matric. only one, Ilyas, appeared and he won a Scholarship. We were unfortunate to lose the Academics Trophy by only half a point. In the Annual Examination ten individual prizes were won by the House. (P) Course in August as many as five were Tempestians. Two of the three cadets (Ex-Sargodhians) sent for training abroad are Tempestians. One is Hasan Varis (ex-43), who is at Cranwell, and the other is Shahid Raza (ex-257), who is in the States.

Year after year Tempestians are proving their superiority and talents. Another feather in our cap this year was the unique distinction earned by Nasir Mahmood Butt (ex-207) in winning all three awards at the Passing Out Parade of Risalpur College held in January, 1963. Nasir was the second Cadet in the history of Risalpur College to receive all three awards. The first cadet was also an ex-Tempestian, Shoaib.

We lost the Chigwell Shield this year not because our boys did not put in their best but merely because a very large number of our Senior boys, whose achievements were mainly responsible for our having won the Shield the previous year, had to leave the School on completion of their studies. This exodus reduced the number of our Seniors to only nineteen. Consequently we sometimes found it extremely difficult to raise even a full seniors' team for some of the tournaments. Nevertheless, despite this handicap, our boys made a bold and determined effort to retain their supremacy at various games, and in fact they were until the Football tournament in October last, level with Fury House—the present Champions.

Warsi's sudden indisposition cost us the Indoor Games Cup, which we lost by a very narrow margin. However, the achievements of Aluddin, Mushtaq Ahmed, and Qaiser in Table-Tennis and of Nazrul (353) and Fakhir Mehdi in Carrom were highly commendable. We won the cricket tournament quite comfortably, our Seniors winning all their matches and Juniors one. Zahid Rashid, Mushtaq Ahmed, Aliuddin and Shahid Aziz batted consistently well, while Masood (389), as usual, made good use of his off-breaks. Among the Juniors, Imtiaz, Mohd Hussain, Ayaz Ahmed Sipra and Raffat Saeed made useful contributions.

We could not do well in Basketball and Debating because our teams were weak. However, Faez Mehdi, Akbar (351), and Shahid Zulfiqar (301) for the Seniors, and Qaiser for the Juniors, played with great skill in Basketball; while Lutful Anis, speaking for the first time in the Inter-House Debate, had the distinction of being declared the second best speaker among the Juniors.

Our victory in Swimming was a foregone conclusion though we must admit that the Tempest boys did give us many an anxious moment before we finally won. Here our Juniors deserve a special word of praise, particularly Hasnat, Rafatullah and Hasan Raza, who swam extremely well. For the Seniors, Amir in the fronterawl, Kamal (450) in breast-stroke and Kamal (395) in diving stole the limelight.

After the swimming triumph our debacle in Football and Hockey came as an anti-climax. We have no excuses to offer for our failure in Football. Our boys did their best; perhaps the luck was against us. What happened in Football was also repeated in Hockey but here we had at least the satisfaction of defeating the Furians—the winners of the tournament. Our boys played a highly spirited game in this match and Faez Mehdi's beautiful stick-work was a treat to watch. We failed to repeat our last year's success in Boxing and only two of our boxers—namely Qasem Chaudhry and Ishtiaq Bashir—managed to win their final bouts. However, Mahbubul Islam and Rana Javed Akhtar deserve a special word of praise for fighting so pluckily in their first appearance. Kamaluddin (395) and Lutful Anis were unlucky to lose their bouts by a very narrow margin, while Amir Ahmed Khan withstood the onslaught of his more experienced opponent, Ilyas of Tempest House, with remarkable courage

Our last success of the year was in P. T. and Gymnastics, in which we beat Fury by a narrow margin. Our boys gave an impressive display in all the P. T. exercises and the standard of our gymnastics was equally good. Ejaz Syed and Faez Mehdi, as leaders of the P. T. and Gymnastic teams respectively, gave a good account of themselves. Our failure in academics was mainly due to the reshuffling of the classes after last year's Final Examinations. Nevertheless, two of our boys, namely Aliuddin, who stood first among the School candidates in the 1961 Senior Cambridge Examination, and Ali Azam, who was selected for an Inter-Wing merit Scholarship, deserve congratulations.

In Athletics we had tough opposition from Sabre House, who deservedly won the cup, but the performance of our boys on the whole was quite impressive. Three of our boys, namely Faez, Mehdi, Raffat Saeed and Ayaz Sipra enhanced the prestige of the House and also brought personal glory to themselves by creating new School records. Faez Mehdi also earned the distinction of being the best Senior Athlete. However, it was rather unfortunate that Warsi, one of the best sprinters that the School has ever known, could not get a correct jump in the Hop Step and Jump, thus losing the event which was surely his.

Our marching standard in the Drill Competition this year was much better than before, and although we could not get the Cup, our performance on the whole was highly satisfactory. Warsi was adjudged the best commander among those of the Junior Flights while Ejaz Syed commanded the Senior Flight with great confidence. More Attackerites took part in gliding this year than ever before and five of them were awarded 'Wings' for going solo. It is heartening to learn that Niaz Nabi was one of the best gliders in his group.

As usual our boys were once again in the forefront in the various School activities and made a substantial contribution to the success of their Alma Mater. The victory of the School in the All-Pakistan Junior Athletics Meet was largely due to the excellent performance of the Attackerites, and Warsi was declared the best Junior Athlete for the third consecutive year—a unique honour for any institution. Seven Attackerites played regularly for the School cricket team during the past year. In other games, too, our contribution was no less impressive.

Outside the School the performances of our Old Boys were highly creditable. Fazle Qadir (ex-131) had the distinction of being awarded the Sword of Honour at the Passing-Out Parade of the Pakistan Military Academy, Kakul, in April, 1962. Seven of our boys were selected for Risalpur this year and the ones already there have been making very satisfactory progress. Two of our ex-boys, namely Mujib (206) and Saklaan (230), also joined the P.M.A. Kakul. Another of our old boys namely Sajjad Akbar has recently returned from the States after successfully undergoing a course in Jet Aircraft Training.

Our efforts to improve the condition of the House have continued unabated. The House Library has been provided with an 'Information Board' and it is hoped that the boys will make full use of it. The main idea is to improve the general knowledge of the boys. We are grateful to Badruzzaman and his assistants, Fakhir, Lutful Anis and Musharraf, for looking after the library so well. Improvements have also been made in the Radio Room, which now looks quite attractive with the addition of new multi-coloured cushions, a new Murphy Radio set and some beautiful pictures. Here a word of praise must be said for Nazrul (429), who has been taking so much pains to keep the room neat and tidy.

The standard of neatness and decoration in the dormitories has markedly improved. This has been largely due to the vigilance and active interest taken by the Dormitory Captains. Rafiuddin and Lutful Anis deserve congratulations as Dormitory Captains on the high standard of neatness in their respective dormitories.

A well-organized Variety Show in which Shahid Aziz (358), Shahid Zulfiqar (301), Faez Mehdi, Nazar Hayat, Kamaluddin (450), Kamaluddin Akbar (395) and Rafiuddin gave excellent performances, was held in March, 1962. The item 'Radio Mixture', which was superbly performed by the first three mentioned above, was greatly appreciated by the audience. The annual picnic to Kalar Kahar was as usual

very successful. Lastly a sumptuous dinner was arranged in May, 1962, in honour of the outgoing boys whose number was incidentally eleven.

In the end I must express my gratitude to Mr. A. B. Chughtai whose help and co-operation made it possible to run the House smoothly. I also thank the House Captains and Prefects for their assistance. My advice to the boys of Attacker House for the coming year is

This year, on account of Ramzan, Founder's Day was held on Saturday, March 9th, nearly a month later than usual. The Commander-in-Chief of the Pakistan Air Force, Air Marshal Asghar Khan, H.Q.A., presided and was accompanied by Mrs. Asghar Khan.

The sky was overcast during the morning and rain threatened. Fortunately the skies cleared round about lunch time and conditions proved excellent as it was cooler than normal for the time of year. There was a goodly attendance of parents and distinguished visitors, but most welcome of all of course were the Old Boys from Risalpur and elsewhere. Those from Risalpur arrived by freighter in the morning and were permitted by the Commandant to stay until the Sunday evening. This enabled the School to play matches with them at Basketball and Cricket. The School won the former while the latter was a tie.

Tho first event was the March Past in eight 'flights'. This was of a higher standard than in the previous year, possibly because the Principal had promised a free cinema show to the smartest 'flight'. This was won by Tempest Juniors. This was followed by a Gymastic display by the School team, led by Masoom, who proved himself a worthy captain by being the outstanding performer. Mr. Ali Sher, the instructor, showed that the passage of years has not yet impaired his agility.


The aero-modelling display opened with successful flights by two gliders and a jetex model, but the rather strong wind brought disaster to the two iree-flight models, both of which crashed within seconds of being launched. Fortunately the control-line models, flown by Hanif and Sajjad, did not suffer a like fate and flew well.

Some finals of the Inter-House Athletics Competition were the next item on the programme. Sabre, for the first time, carried off the Shield, with Attacker, Fury and Tempest occupying the second, third and fourth positions respectively. Faiz Mehdi was declared the best Seniors' athlete, Ozair Ahmed Hanafi, G. A. Warsi, and Saiful Islam tieing for the runner's-up position; while Arman Habib was the Junior champion and Hasnat Ahmed the runner-up. The last two events of the Sports were the Old Boys' Race won by F/O Karim, and the Tug-of-War between the Staff and Old Boys. This last item provided the best fun of the afternoon, such numbers pulling on each side that it was nothing short of a miracle that the rope stood the strain. The result was indecisive,


After a break for tea, the Principal gave a summary of the School's progress and achievements during the past year. Academic results, he said, had been highly satisfactory. All 15 Second Year F.Sc. candidates had passed, 7 in 1st Division, 7 in 2nd, and only 1 in the 3rd, while all 11 First Year candidates had also been successful. Of the 30 Senior Cambridge candidates, 28 had passed, while all 12 Matriculation candidates passed, 10 securing 1st Division, with 4 Scholarships, and and the other 2 getting high second Divisions The School Junior Athletics team had again won the All Pakistan Athletics Championship, held at Lahore, while the Basketball team won the C. T. I. Tournament at Sialkot. More boys had won their 'Wings' at Gliding than in any previous year. The ex-Sargodhians at Risalpur had been faring far better and had been securing top positions in the Entry and College tests. Nasir Mahmud Butt had won the Sword of Honour, the Flying Trophy and the Ground Subjects Trophy at the Passing Out Parade in January, 1963, while Waleed had become the new Wing Under-Officer.

After the Principal's report, the C-in-C presented 'Wings' for gliding to the boys who had won them during the year, the Academic prizes, and the House Trophies. In a brief address, he advised the boys to work hard and take full advantage of the opportunities they had in studying at one of the finest Public Schools in Pakistan. Only by so doing could they fit themselves to serve their country with distinction.

Before the C-in-C left, photographs were taken of him with those who had won their 'Wings' at gliding and also with the Old Boys, among whom we were pleased to welcome a very 'Old Boy', namely Mr. Stott, Headmaster from 1953 to 1958.

S.A.T.C. WING ACTIVITIES

Gliding

In March, 1962, Flt./Lt. Beg, who had been our Gliding Instructor for three ears, left to join the staff at the P.A.F. College, Risalpur. During his time here, the umber of boys who gained their 'Wings' steadily increased each year, and Gliding was ar more efficiently run than before. The School owes much to him for the hard work e put in, and many will remembar him with gratitule and affection. A farewell tea arty was held in his honour on 16th March.

Flt./Lt. Akbar took over charge on Flt./Lt. Beg's departure, and he was assisted proughout the year by Flt./Sgt. Hussain. Thanks to their able instruction, a record umber of 31 boys gained their 'Wings', 4 of whom also achieved Category 'C'. It is rorthy of note that the average number of instructional 'sorties' which a boy is given efore going solo has been much reduced and many get their 'Wings' after 20 to 25 orties. Gliding at the School has now reached the stage when every boy has his chance f gaining his 'Wings' before leaving and very few fail to do so.

The Gliding Trophy, awarded on the basis of 2 points for Category 'C' and 1 point for Category 'B' was shared between Fury and Sabre with 11 points each. Attacker followed with 7 points and Tempest with 6 points.

Aero-Modelling

Aero-modelling activity was somewhat restricted by a shortage of 'kits, for beginners, but a number of free-flight and control-line models were assembled as well as jetex models and gliders.

It was unfortunate that the display on Founder's Day was to a certain extent marred by unfavourable wind conditions, which caused the two free-flight models to crash soon after take-off. However, the gliders flown by Bokhari and Ashfaq and Ghazanfar's Jetex performed well; while Hanif and Sajjad flew their control-line models without mishap and with considerable skill.

THEN AND NOW

It's a human weakness when one recalls the past to remember only what was pleasant and forget all the trials and tribulations. And this applies especially when one recalls one's schooldays. When Old Boys of the pre-1958 period visit the School and tell the present generation of the 'Good Old Days', their listeners might well form the impression that it was a kind of paradise. Well perhaps it was—for the prefects, whose powers were practically unrestricted and who could bully the juniors to their heart's content. The latter certainly led a far less happy existence when I first came to the School in 1957 than they do now, when there is a more careful supervision over the prefects in the exercise of their authority. Another thing which makes life more pleasant now is that there are more picnics and outings to relieve the monotony of life in the 'Sargodha Central Jail.'

Boys live to eat (instead of eating to live) so let's first have a look at the Mess. In the 'Good Old Days' we had to eat off tin plates and the food was about in keeping with the utensils. Of course the Old Boy will tell stories of how the boys went on hunger strike and it all sounds very exciting, but he forgets what caused the strike, namely the inadequacy of the food both in quality and quantity. In 1958 there was a generous increase in the rations, of which the present caterer knows how to make the best use. The messing nowadays is far superior to what it was in those days. Moreover, there is proper crockery and cutlery and the tables all have a plastic covering, which has greatly improved the appearance and cleanliness.

The boys' Houses were little better than barracks in the 'Good Old Days' and nothing like so homely, comfortable and attractive as they are now. There were then no radios or record players as there are now in every House, and the facilities for games in the recreation rooms were about half of what they are now. Every House, moreover, is now provided with curtains throughout, plenty of pictures, attractive bedspreads, mosaic flooring, overhead fans in the prefects' rooms and more fans in the dormitories. Finally in every House there is an excellent little library which is a great boon.

Now let's proceed to the Educational Block, The most outstanding change here is in the library. When I was a new boy, the library consisted of a small number of unattractive books in miserable cases parked on the floor so that it was a back-breaking job to see what was in them. And it was hardly worth the effort in any case. Now the library has improved out of all recognition both in respect of the quantity of the books and the general arrangement. It is, in fact, a library which we can justly be proud of. Near the science block there is now an open-air auditorium, which proves ideal for the weekly cinema show, the Inter-House Boxing and Debating, and for any speech-making occasion. The acoustics in the hall are so bad that nothing can be heard

beyond the first two or three rows so the auditorium is a real boon. Talking of the Hall reminds me of how we used to sweat physically, as well as mentally, during examinations in the hot weather as there were no fans there in those days whereas now there are plenty. Another great improvement are the boards near the Principal's office showing the names of boys who have been selected for Risalpur and also the Houses which have won the Chigwell Shield. There are also some good pictures in this area.


Our next visit must be to the hospital, now provided with proper hospital beds and blankets, games facilities, pictures, a radio, a small library, and throughly smart in appearance throughout with an attractive fountain in the well-kept garden. In the 'Good Old Days' when we were sick our beds had to be taken there from the houses, and the condition of the ward was depressing enough to make a patient feel worse than he really was. We were thankful to escape from it, but now, I must confess, it's rather the reverse.

The School grounds, too, are far better kept than they were formerly. There are now flower beds everywhere, the hedges are trimmed regularly and the roads kept cleaner. There was a time when only about one bulb in three of the road lights used to function, but this is no longer the case and the roads are well lit.

The educational standard is higher now. Boys take their Senior Cambridge on an average a year younger than they once did and results have improved. There are now Mid-Term as well as Terminal tests. Some boys may regard this as a step in the wrong direction, but undoubtedly it makes boys work harder and there is now an afternoon detention class for the benefit of idlers. Moreover, the results of all tests are sent in detail to the parents and this certainly is an incentive to work for all except the incorrigibles.

In games, in spite of the fact that most boys now leave the School considerably younger than they once did, the standard has shown little if any deterioration. The Basketball team won the last C.T.I. tournament, the Junior Athletics team won the West Pakistan Championship, records are still being beaten at athletics and swimming, while the cricket team was recently good enough to hit up scores of 248 for 5 wkts. and 187 for 3 wkts. against the bowling of Dildar, perhaps the best bowler in the P.A.F.


Inter-House rivalry for the Chigwell Shield is certainly far keener than it has ever been in the past, and Debating, Gymnastics and P.T. are now included in it. The Cross Country race has very wisely been dropped as it undoubtedly resulted in boys exerting themselves to the point of absolute exhaustion, which may well do permanent harm. Another very sensible change is the award of equal points for both Senior and Junior competitions—a great encouragement to the juniors.

Scarcely a boy now passes out of the School who has not won his 'Wings' and quite a number gain Category 'C' as well.

Well, I hope I haven't been unduly critical of the 'Good Old Days'. Improvements naturally come, or should come, as time goes on; and in the case of this School there have been many improvements since 1957 when I first joined. And when I hear Old Boys of the early generation spinning yarns about past incidents, I cannot help thinking of the Poet's words.

How strange the tricks our memory plays When we recall our early days; The ills forgot, the joys remain, We'd gladly live them o'er again.

But would we really? I wouldn't for one. It may be pleasant to talk about them and swop stories, but as far wanting to go through it all again, not a bit of it!

A TRIP TO THE NORTH-WEST FRONTIER

It is a custom at this School for the East Pakistan boys, who stay here in the winter vacation, to go on a trip for three or four days. The trip is usually restricted to a range of 120 miles, so Lahore is the usual destination. It was therefore without much optimism that we approached the Principal and and asked if we might go on a trip to Warsak and the Khyber in the last winter vacation. Imagine our amazement and delight when he agreed with scarcely a murmur, possibly on account of being pre-occupied with writing terminal reports, which spoil so many holidays. We vanished from his office in a flash before he had a chance of calculating the distance and perhaps changing his mind.

What a cheer we gave as at about 7 A. M. on the 11th January our party of 26 boys drove in the School bus through the gates of the 'Sargodha Central Jail', as we affectionately call the School. Boys are inclined not to appreciate fully the facilities and comforts the 'Jail' provides until they finally leave it and join some other institution. Then they heartily wish they were once again back in the 'Jail', which they miss more than they ever believed possible.

Mr. Taqvi, Tempest Housemaster, who was accompanying the party very wisely and considerately sat in the front with the driver so that we could 'let off steam' without any restraint. It was pretty cold at this early hour on a winter's morning,

but we kept ourselves warm by stamping so vigorously that the old bus, which in any case should have been pensioned off years ago, seemed likely to disintegrate. What with cheering, singing, cracking jokes, clapping, dancing, and tunes on a flute and mouth organ, we manged to pass the time pretty enjoyably. Then, after about a two hours' run, we reached the Salt Range. For about ten miles there was a fairly steep ascent with many twists and turns, and a precipice on one side. Some boys enjoyed it a lot, but other didn't feel so good and were thankful when we reached the top and the road became straight again. By this time the initial excitement had worn off somewhat and by the time we reached Taxila—our first objective—a number of boys were fast asleep.

On the lawn in front of Taxila Museum we had the packed lunch which we had brought with us. We then visited the museum, full of interesting relics of a long-past age, as well as two archaeological sites at Jaullian and Sirkap. The former, the site of an ancient university, was particularly interesting. During the hour or two which we spent at Taxila we certainly learnt more about ancient history than we do in months of studying dry-as-dust text books and notes. For the first time history seemed to come to life.

Our next stop was at the Cadet College, Hasan Abdal, where the acting Principal, Sqn. Ldr. Beg, had very kindly made excellent arrangements for our night's stay. Two of his sons were at our School and a third joined in the last entry, so he knew all about us. When we visited the mess—a very fine one—to our surprise we found an old friend—Mr. Qureshi, once our caterer, who was obviously delighted to see us.

Next morning we paid a visit to the Cement Works and the Ordnance Factory at Wah, where there is also a very fine mosque. At both places we were very well looked after by the authorities, who showed us everything of interest. We also visited the famous Sikh religious site known as Panja Sahib, to which thousands of Sikhs make a pilgrimage every year.

After having lunch at the Cadet College, we took leave of our hosts and set out for Peshawar, on the way crossing the famous Attock Bridge over the Kabul river. The huge fort, built in the time of Akbar, impressed us greatly. In the evening we reached Peshawar, where there was some delay as we had expected to be met by our Air Headquarters liason officer. In the end some other officer very kindly showed us the way to the WAPDA rest house at Warsak, where accommodation had been arranged. After supper, we all slept soundly as the day had been a tiring and busy one.

Next morning we set out for the Warsak Dam—one of our main objectives and we were certainly not disappointed with what we saw. The hugo lake formed by the Dam was a magnificent sight, while the turbines and power house, buried in the hill-

side, seemed a masterpiece of engineering. Our guide explained everything in detail though the terrific roar made him almost inaudible. However, we certainly learnt a lot more about hydro-electricity than we could ever learn from our text books.

After lunch we visited Peshawar, and after seeing various places of interest most boys went to see the inevitable picture while others called on friends whose homes were in the city. It was pretty late when we returned to Warsak.

The following morning was spent on a trip to the historic Khyber Pass. As we passed through the tribal area, we felt as if we were passing through some alien country. Nearly every man carried a rifle. The houses were quite primitive, being made of mud and with mud walls round them. We waved as we passed groups of young Pathan boys and they waved back, but our efforts to attract the attention of the Pathan maidens met with no similar response. The mountains on both sides of the road were wild and barren and the road itself seemed highly dangerous, so it was with a feeling of relief that we reached Torkham on the Pak-Afghan border, where Pakistani and Afghan soldiers are on guard a few yards distant from each other

On our way back to Peshawar we stopped at Landi Kotal, where the few of us who could afford to do so made purchases at extraordinarily low prices, to the envy of those who had been less economical. In Peshawar the father of Atiq (629T) very kindly entertained us to tea and then very generously stood us a free picture, after which we made our way back to Warsak for our last night's stay there.

On the 15th morning we said good-bye to Warsak. After spending some time in Peshawar, we set off for Rawalpindi, lunching at Nowshera on the way. The bus broke down in Pindi, and when it had been repaired we made for the Officers' Mess in Chaklala. There we met several ex-Sargodhians, namely Khalid Raza, Shamim, Waheed and Shoaib, who looked after us well.

On the 16th we went to Chaklala airfield as we wanted to see the air display which was part of the Armed Forces Day programme. After this we drove into Rawalpindi where we saw a final picture before setting out for Sargodha at about 3 P.M.

This last stage of the journey was uneventful and nobody knows much about it as we slept practically the whole way. We reached Sargodha at about 10 P. M. After a welcome meal, we went straight to bed and were asleep almost as soon as our heads touched our pillows.

Thus ended a most memorable, enjoyable and informative trip. We had seen more of life in West Pakistan in these five days than in all our previous years' stay at the School and none of us is every likely to forget it.
