

EDITORIAL

During 1966 we sent a record number of 35 boys to the P. A. F. College, Risalpur—8 in the February term and 26 in August. As our yearly output is only 50, this means that more than two thirds were successful in passing both the Inter-Services Selection Board and the still more formidable obstacle of the Medical Board.

Academically, too, this has been our most successful year. We sent in 47 candidates for the Senior Cambridge/G. C. E. Examination, 42 gaining School Certificates and the other 5 G.C.E's. As all boys at this School take the Senior Cambridge Examination and not only the better students, as in other schools, we can be justly proud of this result.

Air Headquarters have now decided that after 1967 boys here will take the Matriculation and Intermediate Science or Arts instead of the Senior Cambridge School Certificate. The educational qualification for admission to the P.A.F. College, now to be called the P.A.F. Academy, is to be raised to Intermediate so that Cadets may be awarded a degree on passing out. A further advantage of this change will be that those who are medically unfit for flying can be accepted for training for the technical branch of the P.A.F. if they have passed Inter-Science. But there is no rose without a thorn. Discarding the Senior Cambridge inevitably means a lower standard of English; and we have been told repeatedly that Sargodhians fare comparatively better at Risalpur because of their higher standard of English. Again, how will Inter-Arts students fare at Risalpur? They will have been out of touch with Mathematics and Science for over two years by the time they join Risalpur. Time alone will tell whether the change is for the better or not.

At the time of writing—December, 1966—there are 66 Sargodhians at the P.A.F. College—our biggest number ever. Not one, we are glad to say, has been relegated or terminated on academic grounds during the past year. Inevitably some have not made the grade in flying but such cases mostly join the navigation or ground branch of the P.A.F., or are transferred to the P.M.A. Kakul. When the 42nd course passed out in July 1966, half of those who got their 'Wings' were Sargodhians and they secured the first two places in order of merit. Two more from the same course are now under training at Cranwell, where they are doing exceptionally well.

We take this opportunity to welcome some new arrivals on the staff, viz. Messrs Mohd Aslam, Mohd Tahir and Farooq Latif on the teaching side, and F/O Sirajul Haque as Bursar. We also wish to congratulate Mr. Hussain on being appointed Principal of the Divisional Public School Lahore, and Mr. Khalique Qureshi and Mr. Noor Mohammad on getting their M.A. Degrees in Urdu and English respectively.

Last but not least, congratulations to Fury House on winning the Championship Shield for the eighth time in thirteen years.



Senior Cambridge and G. C. E. Examination, November, 1966

Of the 47 candidates who appeared, 16 secured 1st Division, 21 2nd Division, 5 3rd Division while the remaining 5 obtained the G.C.E. This is our best result to date in so far as the percentage of 1st and 2nd Divisions was considerably higher than before. As no boys were held back either in the Pre-S.C. or Senior Cambridge Class, and as we send every boy in for the Senior Cambridge Examination and not just the best students, we feel that we can be justly proud of this result. No less than 15 candidates secured Distinctions in English Literature.

ABOUT THE P.A.F. COLLEGE, CRANWELL

I joined the Pakistan Air Force College in August 1964. Soon I was moulded into a Flight Cadet (with the usual amount or gentle persuasion by my seniors!) and I began to enjoy my stay there. Little did I then know that my stay at Risalpur was to be a comparatively short one.

Everyone knows how the slightest bit of out-of-the-ordinary news spreads like wildfire. Well, one day someone mentioned that in all probability, Risalpur would be sending two cadets to Cranwell. Cranwell? Oh, of course! Cranwell! where the Royal Air Force College is.

Everyone has heard of England; everyone has heard of the Royal Air Force; but very few have heard of Cranwell. This is not as susprising as it would seem because over here, in Great Britain, very few people have heard of it. Sandhurst—Yes: Dartmouth—Yes: but Cranwell—No! Nevertheless, this can be easily explained. Cranwell is a very select place where only those potential officers of the R.A.F. go who are to be given permanent commissions and almost certainly reach the top. Probably because of this, Cranwell is not publicised to a great extent. This, however, does not alter the fact that Cranwell is the best Air Force training institution in the world.

It was but natural on my part to aspire to be one of the two who were to go to Cranwell. Everyone anxiously awaited the selection but soon hopes began faltering because nothing was heard about it from the authorities for quite a considerable period.

Now it happened. One day, out of the blue, came orders for fourteen of us to visit the senior Humanities Tutor for interviews. Out of the fourteen, eight were ex-Sargodhians. From then on, it was interviews, tests and so on. Finally there were five of us left for the Medical Examination, of whom four were ex-Sargodhians and the fifth an ex-Topian. Needless to say, all five of us were declared medically fit. Then came the final interview with Air Commodore Yusuf. It must have been difficult for him to decide but finally I was selected along with Flt. Cdt. Niaz (432 A).

Then came the paper work. Forms to fill, documents to sign, passports to be made etc. All clear at last, and on 25th March 1965 we boarded an aircraft for London. A couple of days in London and then a train to a place 100 miles up north—a place called Cranwell.

Cranwell sprawls over an area of approximately eight square miles. There are two airfields—the North airfield and the South airfield. There is a complete associated station to run the College and the airfields. Cranwell has a 'group' status which in the R.A.F. comprises at least two or three stations. Furthermore,

Cranwell is the second largest Air Force Station in Great Britain. The College consists of 450 Flight Cadets and about 650 Officers. The total strength of the station is about 7,000 people. There are two main academics buildings—Trenchard Hall and Whittle Hall. In the former all the sciences and technical subjects are studied and in the latter the Humanities are taught.

The College itself is divided in two—the Junior Mess and the Senior Mess. As the name implies, the Junior Mess accommodates the cadets in their junior year (i.e. the first year of their two and a half year stay at Cranwell). Then the cadets move up to the Senior Mess. The Senior Mess is a huge building and very self-contained. It has accommodation for the senior cadets of all four squadrons that are in the College (A, B, C and D). There is a huge dining hall, very richly furnished ante-rooms, an enormous library, two television rooms, a bar and the offices of various persons who are concerned with the efficient running of the College.

Cranwell has a very extensive and thorough training programme. We are taught not only flying here but also all the sciences connected with it. Aerodynamics, Electronics, Thermodynamics, Structures, Radio and Navigation Aids, Avionics, and an optional subject which a cadet can choose from a wide variety of technical subjects. I am doing Flight Control here and Flt. Cdt. Niaz is doing Nuclear Physics. Apart from the Flying Training and Academic Training, the third aspect of Cranwell is Officer Training.

In Officer Training, we are taught War Studies, Defence Economics, and here again an optional subject. Flt. Cdt. Niaz is doing International Affairs whereas I am studying the German language. In languages, Cranwell caters for French, Russian and German. We have an excellent language laboratory and excellent audio-visual aids. We are also taught how to handle weapons ranging from the '303 to the Bren Gun.

Included in officer training are the frequent exercises held in the countryside or abroad where we live under battle conditions, and we are trained in survival in various types of climatic conditions and terrain. We had a course of Jungle Survival in Germany, which, though extremely arduous, proved very beneficial in our training.

Sport facilities at Cranwell are very extensive but the time that can be devoted to it is rather limited. We have here facilities for cricket, rugger, soccer, hockey, golf, riding, basketball, fencing, shooting, rowing, sailing, swimming (a huge centrally heated indoor swimming pool, I might add) etc., etc. Apart from that, there are a huge number of clubs for various subjects like fine arts,

aero-modelling, photography, hovercraft (Cranwell has built two of its own hovercraft), gliding, car racing, go-cart racing, water-skiing, deep sea diving, mountaineering, etc. Cadets are free to join any of these.

Cranwell has a fine social life too. We have mid-term dances, guest nights and a Graduation Ball every term. Needless to say these occasions are attended by a good deal of the 'brass' of the R.A.F. Apart from these occasions, we are often invited to parties and dances at the girls' colleges around Cranwell.

From Cranwell you can get a chance to see the world too. So far I have been to Belgium, Luxemburg, Holland, Iceland, Sweden, France, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, etc. Cranwell finances the various societies in their expeditions abroad. They also visit the NATO forces in Europe and the S.H.A.P.E. (Supreme Headquarters of the Allied Powers in Europe) in Paris.

Cranwell is an institution worthy of all the honours it has received. (The college has got the Queen's Colour). I have enjoyed my stay here very much.

The education here is in all respects complete and extremely useful. Cranwell does not turn out just a Pilot— it turns out a perfect officer, an excellent pilot and a perfect gentleman. Cranwell turns out scholars who can stand up in society and speak intelligently on almost any subject under the sun—be it English Literature or Computors or Nuclear Physics or Space. It turns out a Man who can hold his own in this modern world of ours.

Although we won only one Trophy, namely Academics, in 1966, we secured second position in no less than six of the other ten Inter-House Competitions. Thus we managed to move up from last to second place in the over-all Championship. Let's hope that this upward trend continues in 1967 and that we dethrone the present Champions. Our prospects of doing so appear quite bright.

In Cricket, the first competition, our senior team depended far too much on the efforts of two players—Zaki and Syed Afzal—and so won only one match. Our Juniors, thanks to the all-round performance of Zakaullah and Farooq Raza, and the batting of Qamar, won two of their three matches but this gave us only third position. The less said about Basketball, the better. We failed to win a single match. But we fared much better in Debating, in which we secured second position. We won the Seniors' English Debate and the Juniors' Urdu, Shahid Karim and Junaid Iqbal being declared the best speakers. We also came second in Indoor Games, in which Naeem Sheikh, Zakaullah and Salman Yasin distinguished themselves in the Seniors. and Qamar, K. P. Akbar, Razzaq and Waheed in the Juniors. But we again met with disaster in Swimming, in which we dropped to fourth position. Our only successes were in the Seniors' Front Crawl and the Juniors' Plunge, won by Farid Bilgrami and Shafiq-ul-Islam.

Thus by the end of the first term we were lying last in the over-all Championship with only 20 points, 13 points behind the leaders—Fury. But in the second term we really came into our own, and although we did not succeed in overtaking the leaders, we made a very strong challenge and scored more points than they did—34 against 30.

In Football we put up a close fight for first place but were beaten by 1 point by Tempest. Rashid, Bakhtiar, Beg and Rafique played particularly well in the senior matches, and Yousuf, Khalid and Shafiqul Islam in the Juniors. In Hockey, too, we failed to secure first place by only 1 point. In the Seniors, Beg, Rashid and Masud were especially prominent. while Qamar, Khalid Jamil and Waheed played well for the Juniors. The University team were decidedly alarmed when they heard that the great man was coming to play against them, and they decided that the only thing to do was to offer him a lot to drink before the game started. To their delight he accepted their offer and drank several glasses of champagne. The plan, however, failed completely. "Are you hurt, Tom?" asked W. G. anxiously.

Tom slowly rose and, turning round, showed a large patch of mud on the seat of his trousers.

"No, doctor," said Tom, "but I've got my diploma."

When Yorkshire were playing against the South Africans, the South African, H. B. Cameron, hit Hedley Verity, the famous bowler, for 3 fours and 3 sixes in one over. At the end of the over Arthur Wood, the Yorkshire wieket-keeper, remarked to Verity, "You'll soon have him out now, Hedley. You've got him in two minds. He doesn't know whether to hit you for 4 or 6."

Quick as lightning Patsy called out, "Look out: he's (i. e. the wicket-keeper) missed it." Robins turned round and flung himself full length on the muddy pitch to just get his bat inside the crease.

The crowd roared and Robins got up feeling pretty pleased with his effort as he brushed the mud off his shirt and trousers. Then he looked up and saw to his horror that the bails were off, and wicket-keeper Harry Elliot was tossing the ball from hand to hand and chatting to the slip fieldsmen. He hadn't missed it!

George Macaulay, a famous Yorkshire bowler, who loved taking wickets but hated having runs scored off him, was once bowling against E. F. Longrigg of Somerset. 'Mac' was still laughing. "It's all very well laughing," remarked umpire Bill Reeves, "but supposing it had been an inch or so lower—it might have hit him in the glasses and blinded him."

'Mac's laugh vanished, but not out of sympathy for Bowes. He suddenly realised that not only had a catch been dropped but 8 runs had been given away. "Hit him in the glasses!" he said angrily. "It should have killed him. Fancy missing a 'sitter' like that!"



FOUNDER'S DAY, 10TH DECEMBER, 1966

It has now been decided to revert to the old custom of having the School Founder's Day in December instead of at the beginning of March. There are two main reasons for this decision. First, the weather is better in December; secondly, the introduction of the Matriculation in the School makes it undesirable that Founder's Day should be held in March just before the examination takes place.

The Guest of Honour on this occasion was Air Commodore M. A. Dogar, S. J., S.Q.A., Asst: Chief of Air Staff (Admin). As the band of the Ambala High School was not available on this occasion, the Principal of the Police Training School kindly put his band at our disposal. Though small in numbers, this band played its part and its music admirably with the result that the March Past, with which the proceedings opened at 2 p. m., went off very well. The same, however, cannot be said of the Aero-modelling display which followed Two models crashed ignominiously soon after taking off, while another refused to start. Fortunately Naeyem Sheikh flew his control-line model beautifully and thrilled the spectators by making it dive almost vertically to within inches of the ground before bringing it up again.

The next item was a display by the School Gymnastics team, which included several comparatively young boys. It says much for their courage that they performed all the exercises, including somersaults over the side and long box, without any support from the instructor, Mr. Ali Sher. An unrehearsed incident added interest to the proceedings when one of the mats caught fire when the Gymnasts were diving through the fire ring.

A mass P.T. display by the whole School was the next event and this proved to be the highlight of the day. The timing was well-nigh perfect and drew round after round of applause from the spectators. It was certainly the best P. T. display of any so far given on Founder's Day.


Some events of the Inter-House Athletics Competition followed. In the events decided earlier Attacker House had gained a slight lead but at one stage on this afternoon Fury managed to overtake them. However, Attacker fought back strongly and eventually emerged winners of the Athletics Trophy.

After the Inter House Athletics finished, there were some light-hearted events. Flt/Cdt. Feroze won he Old Boys race, while the tug-of-war between the Staff and Old Boys was remarkable mainly for the amount of cheating by both sides. The obstacle race for the Prefects, the final event, was won by Qayyum of Tempest House.

The Principal then read out his report on the progress of the School during 1966. He mentioned that a record number of 34 boys, out of the annual output of 50, had gained admission to the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, during the year; while there had been no failures in the Senior Cambridge/G.C.E. Examination, 38 boys gaining School Certificates and 3 the G.C.E.

The Chief Guest then presented Gliding Wings to the 29 boys who had won them this year. He also gave away the academic prizes, the Inter-House Trophies, various individual prizes, and School Colours to those who had been awarded them during the year. The Championship Shield for the best all round performance in the Inter-House events was won by Fury House for the third successive year and the eighth time in thirteen years.

The Chief Guest then addressed the gathering. He said that this was his first visit to the School and he had been much impressed by what he had seen. He congratulated the staff and boys on the excellent progress the School had made during the past year. He was particularly pleased at the increasing number of boys being sent to Risalpur and he hoped that in course of time the two P.A.F. Schools would supply Risalpur with nearly all the Cadets that were needed. He emphasised the importance of quality. It was quality, he said, that had enabled the P.A.F. in last September's war to achieve success against an enemy who was vastly superior in quantity.

LIFE AT THEP.A.F. COLLEGE, RISALPUR

My main object in writing this article is to give those who are to join the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, a few hints which may prove useful to them. After all, 'Fore-warned is fore-armed'. It is better to know the pitfalls beforehand than to learn of them by bitter experience—as I did.

In the first place newcomers now no longer need be scared about 'ragging'. There was a time when the 'ragging' of newcomers by the seniors was so unpleasant, so humiliating and degrading, that some boys were reluctant to join Risalpur, or, having joined, wished they hadn't. This is now old history, and the College authorities have very wisely taken firm action to put a stop to this blot on its reputation. Of course the barber still has his little joke. Almost the first place to which a newcomer is directed is the barber's shop; and the barber has curious ideas as to the style of hair-cut best suited to newcomers. Even one's girl friend would hardly recognise one, or would hardly care to do so, when one comes out. 'Hero to zero' aptly describes the transformation. However, what does it really matter? It will grow again.

During the first term, and especially in the early part, the main aim of the authorities is to help the Cadets to adjust themselves to their new, and very different, life; and considerable allowances are made for mistakes being made through new Cadets not being familiar with all the rules and regulations. Still, a newcomer is strongly advised to make himself acquainted with the regulations as soon as possible. He should pay particular attention to smartness in turn-out and bearing. He must swing his arms properly when walking—at any rate when any senior is in the vicinity. And he must 'wish' Staff and Seniors in a polite and sensible way and remember to call them 'Sir'. Above all, a newcomer should never try to be over-smart or be a show-off in any way. He should be smart, modest, and keen on all the activities in which he has to participate, but he should never try to make himself conspicuous.

Studies are very important at Risalpur. If a Sargodhian does a reasonable amount of work, he should not find himself in difficulties academically for he starts with a considerable advantage over most other entrants due to the superior knowledge of English he has acquired by being a Senior Cambridge student.

As the medium of instruction is English and as a greater weightage is given to English than to any other subject, this advantage is a very real one. Moreover, Cadets are expected to speak in English at all times. The other subjects are by no means difficult and there can be no reason, other than idleness, for faring poorly. The number of subjects is about 8 in the first term, rising to about 14

In the second, and then decreasing to 7 and 6 in the last two terms. Some Sargodhians seem to have the idea that once they get to Risalpur all is plain sailing. This is by no means the case and the sooner they realise this the better.

The second term is perhaps the toughest, with the maximum of everything—maximum studies, maximum sports and maximum punishments. The number of subjects is nearly doubled and this means regular work to escape relegation or termination. Extra activities in General Service Training in this term include Shooting, Gliding and Riding. Cadets in their second term can no longer escape punishment by pleading ignorance of rules and regulations, hence punishments are unpleasantly frequent.

The third term is the one that decides the fate of most Cadets for it is in this term that they start flying training. This is, of course, by far the most interesting phase of a Cadet's life. Most Cadets feel a bit air-sick in the early stages but they must not be discouraged by this as it is usually a passing phase. Nor must a cadet get discouraged if he finds the instructor a bit tough with him when he persists in making mistakes. Instructors have a playful habit of bringing an erring pupil to his senses by a sharp rap on the inside of the knee with the joystick, by causing a pupil's head to come in sharp contact with the canopy by a sudden forward movement of the stick, or by a dose of aerobatics. And a Cadet may find his vocabulary increased by a few new expressive words. But these little pleasantries on the part of the instructor are all part of the game and must be taken in the right spirit. Instructors are a long-suffering race and can hardly be expected not to express their displeasure fairly forcibly at times. Sargodhians have a considerable advantage when it comes to flying as they have almost all been solo in the glider at the School and are thus familiar with the basic principles.

On the T 37 a Cadet normally goes solo after about 20 hours' instruction, but it takes considerably longer on the Harvard. Some Sargodhians of my course did go solo in the Harvard in less than 20 hours in their first term and Shahid Kamal, now at Cranwell, set up a record of 16 hours, but this is quite exceptional. The Harvard is generally considered a difficult and uncomfortable plane compared with the T 37. Flying training includes aerobatics, formation, cross country and night flying. The latter is particularly interesting and one can add to the enjoyment by listening to songs & music on the radio.

In their final term, the Cadets are the 'bosses' of the College and they have considerable privileges. But they also have considerable responsibilities for if anything goes wrong in the College they have to answer for it to the Squadron Commander. Nor can they afford to take it easy with Graduation so close at hand. There can be no greater disappointment for a Cadet than to find himself terminated

or relegated when so near the coveted goal, and this is not likely to happen if he does not slack off. And so at last the great day arrives and those who have survived all the hazards of the two years' course receive the proud reward for it all—a commission in the Pakistan Air Force.

They are various other points about life at Risalpur which will be of interest to aspiring entrants. 'Every youth has a wolf in his belly', and certainly the strenuous life at the College is productive of a very healthy appetite. This is well catered for by the College authorities. The food is good and ample—probably better than in most officers' messes. The Pay—Rs. 170 per month—is quite adequate provided one is not unduly extravagant and doesn't smoke a lot—a habit which, though not forbidden, is frowned on by the College authorities.

P.T. and Drill are both pretty tough at Risalpur and Drill is especially important. No boy at Sargodha should get the idea that the P.T. and Drill he does at Sargodha is a waste of time. They stand him in good stead when he gets to Risalpur and help him to escape a good deal of trouble.

Punishments at Risalpur really are punishments. An Extra Drill at Sargodha is a mild affair—unless the Principal happens to be watching. But at Risalpur Extra Drills are distinctly unpleasant. Marching and doing double mark time for half an hour with a rifle held out in front or above one's head makes one sweat even in the winter so it can be imagined what it is like in the summer.

Restrictions, normal up to 3 but may even go up to 28, are a more serious form of punishment. They necessitate attending all Extra Drills for the period, no leave, and reporting at regular intervals. Another form of torture are Assemblies, which are held quite frequently. These are not intended as a punishment but to give out instructions and advice or to emphasise College orders. The Cadets at Assemblies have to sit cross-legged and absolutely motionless from one to two hours while Seniors address them from time to time. And if anyone stirs the torture is prolonged. It's sheer agony—and what makes it worse is that it's usually just for nothing.

There are plenty of clubs one can join if one feels inclined, such as aero-modelling, photography and music, or one can take part in dramatics or debating contests. One can visit Nowshera every Sunday—unless on restrictions—and go on week-end leave to Peshawar once a month. So life can be quite pleasant, or at any rate one imagines it can be—after one has left!

THE SCHOOL LIBRARY

The importance of a well-stocked library and a reading room in an educationa institution, such as ours, which aims at producing officers for the Air Force, need not be stressed here. The training of a potential leader of men is quite a subtle affair. Besides so many other qualities he must be well equipped with the latest information and knowledge. We have heard it being said that anyone who lacks brains would find a place in the Armed Forces, because brains are what you don't need there. This is a very incorrect picture of a good officer in any of the Armed Services. Without an alert mind and a fair amount of common sense, apart from the technical know-how, it is not possible to become a really efficient officer.

Our College library aims at providing suitable reading material to the boys in order to broaden their out-look and equip them with information, which is not possible with the text only.

The library now contains well over seven thousand books. During the current financial year we have added 190 Urdu books and 336 English books, on various subjects. The difficulty of getting Bengali books in West Pakistan need not be mentioned here; but I am glad to say that we have recently received the first instalment of 38 Bengali books, from East Pakistan, and we are hoping that the other instalments will follow soon.

We are grateful to the Asia Foundation for making a gift of 32 valuable books to the library. We are also grateful to Air Marshal Asghar Khan for sending us an English-Urdu Dictionary, as a gift.

In the reading room we have three English, one Urdu and one Bengali dailies. We are at present contributing to 13 English and 7 Urdu magazines.

Through the keen interest of the Principal, we have been lucky to add a portion of the back verandah to the library in October last year. This is a very welcome addition, because we have been able to shift the office and the Reference Library to the newly constructed portion. The main portion was getting rather over-crowded and it had become difficult to accommodate new almirahs there.

The race between the arrival of new books and the availability of new almirahs for stocking them, still seems to continue. After long and patient waiting we received two new almirahs from the M.E.S. in January this year. These have already been filled up. There are still a large number of books, however, which cannot be put on the shelves because of lack of space. We have been promised another two almirahs soon and we hope the M.E.S. will not disappoint us.

THE PHOTOGRAPHIC CLUB

The cost of photographic films and papers has gone very high and photography has become a very expensive hobby, but in spite of this there appeared to be no lack of enthusiasm among the members. The weekly cinema shows continued to enjoy popularity in spite of the fact that a few of them were repeated as new films were not available due to import restrictions.


Several educational films on child psychology, hygiene, general science, geography and sports were exhibited along with feature films through the courtesy of the U.S.I.S. and the B.I.S.
