## EDITORIAL

It is gratifying to be able to record that the period under review in this journal—March 1964 to February 1965—has been the most successful 12 months in the School's history.

Last year we expressed our dissatisfaction with the results achieved by our candidates at the Inter-Services Selection Board. This year no such grounds for complaint exist, only 2 out of our 39 candidates having been rejected. The Central Medical Board, too, has been equally kind. As a result, we have sent a record number of 29 boys to Risalpur during the past 12 months.

In Academics, too, we have had our best year. No fewer than 48 boys passed their Senior Cambridge and G. C. E. Examinations, easily beating our previous best. The policy of sending every boy for the Senior Cambridge Examination and none for the Matriculation is amply justified by the general academic superiority of our boys at the P.A.F. College, Risalpur.

Once again a new record has been set up in the number of boys who won their 'Wings' at Gliding. This year the number was 44 as compared with 35 in the previous year.

The achievements of Sargodhians at Risalpur have also been a cause of much satisfaction in the past 12 months. In both Passing Out Parades (June 1964 and January 1965) Sargodhians won the Flying Trophy, while the Ground Subjects Trophy also went to a Sargodhian in June 1964. The two boys selected for training at Cranwell in February 1965 were both ours—in fact all the five from whom the final selection was made were from this School.

In November, 1964, we had to say good-bye to Mr. Zafar Alam, who had been on the Staff since January, 1956. He left us to take up the post of Assistant Educational Adviser in the Ministry of Education. We wish him the best of luck in his new career and we hope he will find time to visit us occasionally. We welcome Mr. R.W.Y. Fletcher, who joined us in October, 1964, and took over the post of Assistant Housemaster, Tempest House, from Mr. Zafar Alam. We also welcome Mr. M.A. Jabbar, who joined us in April, 1964, to teach Islamiat and Bengali.

The Inter-House Championship was won by Fury House, who thus annexed the Chigwell Shield for the sixth time in eleven years. But they achieved final victory only after many anxious moments and after a keen—almost too keen—struggle with Tempest House. At times the winning and losing of some particular competition assumed an importance out of all proportion to the context, and defeats were not in all cases accepted with the best possible grace. We hope this will not be repeated.

In sports the highlights were the winning of the West Pakistan Junior Swimming Championship and the C.T.I. Basketball Championship at Sialkot. The Basketball team also beat Hasanabdal Cadet College and the Military College, Jhelum. It lost no matches throughout the year and could justifiably claim to be the strongest School team in West Pakistan.



#### ACADEMICS

## Senior Cambridge and G.C.E. Examination, November, 1963

We sent a record number of 55 candidates for the Senior Cambridge Examination in November, 1963. Of these 46 passed the Senior Cambridge Examination and 2 the G.C.E. Of those who failed all have subsequently passed. Jamal Hossain set up a new record with 11 points.

This is far the biggest number who have passed from this School. Considering that we do not follow the practice of sending our weak students for the Matriculation Examination, as other Schools do, this result is highly satisfactory. The academic superiority of Sargodhians at Risalpur, proved by the results of the Entry Test which the Risalpur authorities set, amply justifies our policy of taking the far higher standard Senior Cambridge in preference to the very low standard Matriculation.

#### RISALPUR NEWS

A record number of 29 boys joined the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, from this School in the past 12 months—22 in the 42nd Course in August, 1964, and 7 in the 43rd Course in February, 1965. All of these had passed their Senior Cambridge Examination and completed their 1st year F.Sc. They fared remarkably well in the Entry Tests which the Risalpur authorities set to each new entry. Sargodhians who joined the 42nd Entry secured the first 4 places, 8 of the first 10 places, and 15 of the first 20; while of the 7 Sargodhians who joined the 43rd Course, an entry 60 strong, 5 came in the first 10 places and the lowest was 15th.

Those who joined in August, 1964, began flying in their first term, and it is gratifying to note that 4 of the 5 who went solo in their first term were Sargodhians, viz. Shahid Kamal, Niaz Nabi, Mansoor Saleem and Nasir Hussain. The first two have been selected for training at the R.A.F. College, Cranwell, and we are proud to know that all the five Cadets from whom the final selection was made were Sargodhians, the other three being Fareed Shah, Nasir Hussain and K. M. Khalid. In academics Jamal Hossain has topped all tests so far taken by the 42nd Course, thereby keeping up his School record.



Zahid M. Rashid (Ex-279A) receiving the Flying Trophy at the Passing Out Parade at Risalpur in June 1964.







Frankly speaking, our performance at Football and Hockey was not up to standard. However, we did well to beat a star-studded Tempest Team at Football and remained unbeaten in the Juniors at Hockey. While Ehsanullah Azim, Kausar, Asghar and Fahim were outstanding at Football, Azmat, Feroze, Ehsanullah, Saeed and Ibrahim deserve a special mention at Hockey for being both spirited and skilful. Hamid is a very useful new player. While Ehsanullah and Kausar are in the School Football Team; Feroze, Kausar, Ehsanullah and Saeed represent the School at Hockey.

Boxing again pulled us down; but Ehsanullah and Feroze won their weights and Javaid Iqbal was declared the best loser. Hamid also boxed extremely well.

We struck form at P.T. and Gymnastics again. We have never lost this cup except once, and this time again our superiority at Gymnastics was unquestioned. This time, however, we were also first at P.T. and both the Gymnastics Commander (Kausar) and P.T. Commander (Farooq) were declared the best. Ehsanullah, Yasin, Saeed, Kausar and Ikram represented the School on Founder's Day.

We dropped in the ladder at Academics, although Feroze, Khalid Zarif, Jang Bahadur, Saeed, Kalim, Khattak, Shahzad and Zillur secured positions in their respective classes. The biggest feather in our academic cap, however, is that Mushtaq has beaten the previous record in the S.C Examination by securing nine points, which is nothing short of brilliant.

At Drill, too, both our Senior and Junior Flights were declared the best. By winning this Competition we took the lead from Tempest in the Championship.

Last, but not the least, our superiority at Athletics, too, was obvious. We early took such a big lead that the other three Houses had to be content to compete for the 2nd position among themselves. While Feroze and Fahim were declared the best Senior and Junior athletes respectively, Yasin was the second best athlete in the Juniors and also set up a new record of 8'—9" in the Pole Vault. Ehsanullah, Ehsanul Haq and Tariq Ali Khan were also prominent.

From amongst the Old Boys, Salam-ul-Haq has brought the biggest feather in our cap as he is now at Sandhurst.

At Risalpur, Saeed Anwar won the Flying Trophy, while Masoom has beaten the previous record for going solo by half an hour. Warris is an Instructor, Ilyas a Sergeant and Sikander a Corporal. We were happy to welcome as many as 12 Furians from Risalpur on Founder's Day. At the School, too, 12 Furians got their Gliding categories this year and we were second in the Gliding Trophy.

To conclude, I would like to congratulate the Furians on their excellent performance in winning the Chigwell Shield for the sixth time, and I hope they will retain the top position this year again. Our overall performance both on the playground and in the class-room has been quite satisfactory. We moved from third to second position and, due to sheer bad luck at drill, lost a chance of winning the Championship. We were champions in Swimming, Hockey, Academics and Gliding, and runners-up in Basketball, Boxing, P.T. and Gymnastics.

The stars did not favour us in the first term and we were unable to win a single trophy. In cricket we expected to come first, but mumps spread through the House and most of the members, especially of the junior team, were fighting the disease in the hospital instead of fighting our rivals on the cricket field. In spite of this misfortune, Saeedullah, who could play in only one match, had the best batting average in the Juniors, while Abbas and Naweed were fourth and fifth. In the Seniors, Shafqat had the second best batting average and Jamal was third best in bowling.

In Basketball our Juniors were very good, but the Seniors were not so successful and we had to be content with second position. Attaullah did well in the Seniors, while Qadri, our Junior Captain, showed skill and efficiency and the whole game centred round him. In one match, he alone scored as many as 34 points out of a total team score of 38.

The second term started favourably, and swimming, the first Inter-House event, was won easily. While the Seniors were good, the Juniors were excellent. Ekram (622), though a Junior, was declared the best diver and the third best swimmer in the whole School. He also captained the School swimming team which won the All-Pakistan Junior Swimming Championship at Lahore.

In the Football League, neither of the two joint-winners could beat our team; in fact, one of them lost to our Juniors by two goals to nil, the highest score of the competition.

In previous years we had won every Championship except Hockey several times; but this year, hard practice combined with determination resulted in the achievement of this goal too. The Juniors, under the captaincy of Saadat, were the unbeaten champions, while the Seniors lost only one match. Iftikhar Khan rightly deserves congratulations on his untiring efforts in training the teams.

Our Gymnastics was of a high standard but, being bracketed with P.T., we had to be content with second place. As for Drill, on Founder's Day both our flights were declared the best Senior and Junior flights by the Guest of Honour and thus earned an extra picture.

Though five out of a total of twelve weights were won by us, a change in the system of the award of points cost us the Boxing Cup. Tausif, Mehdi Raza, Fakhrul and Mansoor were champions in their weights, while Helal-ud-Din was the champion for the third year in succession.

'Too much stress is laid on games in Public Schools' is a common comment, but we do not forget that studies are equally important and we can rightly claim that we lack neither in brain nor in brawn. On the Academic side, we scored 29 points, while the other three Houses combined got only 13. Jamal Hossain set up a new School record in the School Certificate examination. He also came first in the 1st year Science examination held by the Board of Secondary Education, Lahore. This year as many as eleven Academic prizes have been won. Excluding Jamal, others who received prizes on Founder's Day were Hadi, Wazirul Alam, Shahid (777), Ahsan, Mahboob, Ekram, Khalid, Nasir (645) and Naeem Durrani.

The aim of the school is to make boys air-minded and to supply the P. A. F. Cadet College. To achieve this end, the School has a S.A.T.C. Wing and boys are taught gliding. A good glider usually makes a good pilot. As many as 14 boys of the House were able to make the grade and were awarded 'Wings' by Air Commodore S. A. Yousaf on Founder's Day. Thus the trophy came to the House. Naweed set up a new record by getting his solo in 15 sorties only.

In other events we were unable to obtain a good position, but some individual performances were commendable. Jamal was judged the second best English speaker in the School, while Qadri and Zahid were the second best Junior speakers in English and Urdu respectively. In Athletics, Amin came first in Long Jump and second in Hop, Step and Jump and 110 Metres Hurdles. Iftikhar Malik stood first in High Jump while Wasim won both 110 and 200 Metres Hurdles. Qayyum won first place in Junior Discus.



After winning the Chigwell Shield for the year 1963-1964, the House appeared to rest on its laurels and the year under review saw the decline of Sabre to the 3rd position. But our setbacks were not entirely due to a sense of complacency. It was mainly due to the departure of a large number of good students and games players, most of whom joined Risalpur to bring credit to the House at the P.A.F. College. The senior teams were thus depleted, while the junior teams could not be strengthened because of a comparatively weak 15th entry which joined this House. The newcomers, besides being weak at games, did not put up a good show at studies either, and it was partly because of this that Tempest House beat us at Academics. This weakness is likely to persist for some time and Saberites will have to make a determined effort to win back their position at academics and sports both. There were, however, some notable achievements, the most important being the victory of Sabre in the Inter House Boxing competition. This was the first time we had ever won this trophy, and since this competition has now been abolished, we seem likely to retain the trophy permanently. Whereas the credit for courage and determination goes to the boys, I should mention the hard work and persuasive powers of Mr. Noor Mohammad, whose contribution in this respect has been equally great. Our contribution to the School team which won the West Pakistan Junior Swimming Championship was considerable, four members being Saberites. There is no dearth of individual talent and even now Sabre House continues to provide the School Captains for Cricket, Hockey and Gymnastics. The boys have also worked hard to improve the House and they have indeed made their Radio and Recreation Room a place of happy repose.

The survey of the main events inevitably begins with the Cricket competition.

We had fairly strong teams, and the absence of Zaki from all the matches and of

Haroon from one match was not sufficient excuse for our getting only 3rd position. Daud (440) and Zaka (704) made the greatest contributions in the matches. Cricket was followed by Debates, in which we did better, getting second position. In the English debates the House was represented by Nasir (428) and Mansoor (410) in the Seniors, and by Jawaid (568) and Kidwai (615) in the Juniors. In the Urdu debates we had Kaleem (427) and Jamal to represent the Seniors, and Abbas (559) and Kamran (684) to represent the Juniors.

In Indoor Games also we secured 2nd position. Farooq (719) became the School Junior Champion in Table Tennis. Others who won all their matches were Ikram in Chess, Jamal in Draughts, Afzal in Table Tennis, Meezan in Carrom and Kidwai in Draughts (Juniors). In Basketball, Sabre House went down to the 3rd position. Tiwana (393), the Seniors Captain, was outstanding, while Haroon (445), Hayat (447), Ghani (448), and Mahboob (469) also played very spiritedly. The Juniors, however, did not give enough support to the Seniors. The second term also began with a setback in Swimming, in which we came 4th due to our very weak Seniors. The Juniors were much better. Naseem (664) got a position even in an open event, while Rashid (606), Rafique (627), Rasheed (669), and Shakeel (671) were selected to represent the Junior Swimming team of the School. Very soon, however, victory came our way when our Football teams won the trophy. The Seniors, led and inspired by Meezan, remained unbeaten. Others deserving of mention are Shahid (522), Majeed (572), and Arman (594).

We played Hockey in our new House Colour (changed from maroon to turquoise) but the colour seemed to be rather inauspicious because we descended to the 3rd position once again. Shahid (522), Mumtaz (492), Meezan (562) and Haroon (445) played well for the Seniors. This was followed by our victory in Boxing. Those who won their fights to become the champions of their weights were Rashid (606), Shakeel (671), Pervez (708) and Waheed (754).

Mr. Ali Sher put in considerable effort in training the House team at Gymnastics and he organised an inter-dormitory P.T. and Gymnastics competition; but unfortunately the House could do no better than get the 3rd position. The same position was maintained at Drill. Jamal was adjudged the best commander of the 2nd squad.

By the time the Athletics competition came, the Inter-House position for the Chigwell Shield had become more or less clearly defined. The keenness was therefore rather subdued. The time for prepartion was short and the Saberites had to be content with the 3rd position once again. Meezan (562) broke a record in the Seniors Pole-Vault and Arman (594) was adjudged the 2nd best Senior Athlete. The winning of the Seniors Relay and the Juniors Medley Relay were our best achievements on Founder's day.

As many as eleven boys got their category 'B' at gliding. They are Jameel (444), Zaki (510), Nazeer (536), Afzal (543), Saleem (554), Abbas (559), Jawaid (568), Majeed (572), Anwar (578), and Arman (594). Jamal (490) and Mumtaz (492) were associated with the School News Sheet.

In the past 12 months nine Saberites joined Risalpur, three of whom did so well as to be included among the candidates from whom the selection for training at Cranwell was to be made. This year we had a very large contingent of old Saberites on Founder's Day. Although we again finished at the bottom in the Inter-House Championship, we had a much better record than in the previous year. We won Indoor Games, shared the first position with Sabre in Football, and were placed second in as many as five tournaments, which gave us a total of 55 points as compared to last year's 35. Our performance would have been much better had it not been for the acute shortage of senior boys, of whom there were only twelve left after the first term.

We made a fairly good beginning by coming second in Cricket and winning the Indoor Games Competition. Our success in Cricket was largely due to the good batting of Imtiaz, Niaz Nabi, Sipra and Hadi Rizvi in the Seniors and of Akhtar Kalam and Javed Khan in the Juniors. The bowling honours were shared by Hadi Rizvi and Niaz Nabi for the Seniors and by Javed Saeed and Zafar Iqbal for the Juniors. We won the Indoor Games Cup by a big margin thanks largely to our Juniors, particularly to the boys of the 13th Entry. Talat Mahmud, Zafar Iqbal, Javed Sultan, Nazir Abbas Zaidi, Iqbal Habib and Tahir Rasul made short work of their opponents in all the matches, thus remaining unbeaten champions in the tournament.

We failed badly in the Basketball and Debating competitions. Sultan Mohd Khan and Ayaz Sipra were, however, adjudged the second best speakers in the seniors Urdu and English Debates respectively.

We missed the Swimming Cup by a narrow margin. The absence through illness of Javed Khan and Zafar Iqbal, two of our best swimmers in the Juniors, made all the difference. Nevertheless Anwarul Haq and Hasnat Ahmed enhanced the prestige of the House by coming first and second respectively in the open swimming competition, while Rafatullah, Hasan Raza and Javed Sultan did well in the Inter-House competition.

We shared the first position in Football with Sabre House. Our best achievement in the tournament, thanks largely to Musharraf's brilliant solo effort, was the fine victory of our senior team over a formidable Fury combination. Musharraf was well supported by Sultan, Anis and Hasan. For the Juniors Nayab, Humayun Kabir, Talat, Rana and Zafar Iqbal played extremely well.

We secured second position in Hockey, thus gaining a lead over the other Houses in the Chigwell Shield Competition. This we did by winning both the matches against Sabre and drawing both with Fury. Our Seniors gave an excellent demonstration of skill and stamina when they humbled a strong Sabre team which contained as many as five School players. Ayaz Sipra, Sultan and Hadi deserve special mention for their superb stick-work and ball control. Among the juniors Nayab, Javed Sultan, Talat and Rana played well.

We failed so badly in the next three competitions, i.e. Boxing, P.T. and Gymnastics, and Academics that, despite our fine proformance in Marching and Athletics near the end, we could not fully recover and had to remain content with fourth position. In the Drill competition Qaiser was adjudged the best commander.

Our athletes further salvaged our position and brought us within three points of Sabre, who finished 3rd in the Chigwell Shield. Hasnat easily won both his races, while Mahboob's victory over Arman Habib of Sabre in 100 Metres was a personal triumph for him. Iqbal Habib created a new record in the Juniors' long jump by jumping 18'-6". Javed Saeed, Nayab and Anwar also did well in various track and field events.

#### ON LEAVING THE SCHOOL FOR GOOD

After finishing our Senior Cambridge Examination in November, 1964, we were promoted to the First Year Class in December. But I must confess that few of us took our studies seriously, and the teachers had a pretty difficult time. On occasions classrooms were found to be mysteriously locked from the inside so that neither the boys nor the teacher could enter and we thus had to adjourn to the library, which suited us very well.

After the arrival of the Senior Cambridge result early in March, our interest in studies became even less—if possible—and our interest in unofficial visits to the town and the cinema became even greater. Things finally came to a head when we boys of First Year 'A' Class paid a visit to St. Mary's P.A.F. School, just near our gates, to avenge an insult supposedly offered by some of their boys to one of our class-fellows when he was passing near St. Mary's School. We came to know afterwards that he had really been snooping round their School to spy on the girls, but he told us a different story and we believed him. So we went in good faith to uphold the honour of our Class.

Meanwhile an S.O.S. had been sent by St. Mary's to our Principal. When he arrived, he told us in no uncertain terms what he thought of us. We were a very worried lot when we returned to our Houses, and our fears were increased when we learnt that the School Council was having a meeting. We felt that it had probably met to expel us, and our relief knew no bounds when we were informed that the boys of the F.Sc. Classes need not stay to take the First Year Examination, but could go home if they wished. At first we thought the news too good to be true and nearly every one of us decided to leave for our homes with the least possible delay.

But later that evening second thoughts prevailed. We had been told that those who left would not be given a certificate that they had completed their First Year. We held long discussions among ourselves and gradually the tide of opinion changed in favour of staying. Thus next morning it was found that hardly a boy wished to leave. This came as a great surprise (and disappointment!) to the authorities, so they let it be known that if we stayed we should have to mend our ways—no more being absent from classes or parades, no more going out of bounds and not even the odd cigarette. Any breach of discipline or neglect of studies and we would be sent home. As we felt that there was little chance of our being able to fulfil these conditions, and it was obvious to us that we were not wanted, all but six of us decided to depart while the going was good. It certainly was not worth staying and risking expulsion.

Now started the unhappy task of getting our clearance—returning books, clothing and so on. I shall never forget my last visit to the library to return my

books. How many happy hours I had spent there reading the magazines and newspapers! And now it was all over. I felt thoroughly miserable, and I felt the same wherever I went. Never had the old School seemed so dear to me as it did in those last two days. And I'm sure, with scarcely an exception, everyone else felt the same. We now realised how much we were going to miss it all—even the early morning P.T.! After all, we had spent four happy years here and we now understood how much we owed to those who had done so much to make us feel at home and to assist us in our studies ond other activities.

Then there were the parties which are traditionally given by the Houses to those who are leaving. On these occasions it is the custom for each outgoing boy to say a few words. When my turn came, I found it difficult to utter a word, not because I had nothing to say but because my heart was too full to say it. And it was the same with most of the others.

Finally came the leave-takings. We went from House to House embracing our dear friends, bidding them good-bye and exchanging addresses. It was a sad occasion and many a tear was shed. We also made the round of the Staff to bid them farewell. We realised that we had been a bit of a nuisance to them in the past month or two but this was obviously all forgiven and forgotten and we parted with feelings of mutual affection.

We left the School in batches. The Karachi boys were the first to go, followed in turn by those bound for Lahore, for East Pakistan and finally for Rawalpindi and Peshawar. Each batch was seen off at the station by those who were to go later. I shall never forget the departure of the East Pakistani boys. Although they left at an unearthly hour in the morning—and a Sunday morning at that—pretty well every boy was up to see them off. It was a touching scene.

I was in the last batch to go. I shall never forget my feelings as the bus taking us to the station passed through the gates of the 'Central Jail' as we affectionately call our old School. So far from feeling like an escaped prisoner, I felt more like telling the driver to turn the bus round and take me back to my home-from-home, where I had been so happy. But this could not be, and we had to proceed to the station. Many boys had come to see us off, and having taken an affectionate farewell of them, I entered my compartment with a heavy heart.

But there is one consolation. Although my days as a student at the P.A.F. School, Sargodha, are over, I know that I shall receive a warm welcome whenever I have a chance to visit it again—and I am sure I shall find many such chances.

### THE CHIGWELL SHIELD, 1964.

Although Fury House eventually won the Chigwell Shield for the Inter-House Championship—for the sixth time in 11 years—they did not clinch their victory until the final competition. In fact, if Tempest had come first and Fury last in the final competition—Athletics—Tempest would have won the over-all Championship. It is interesting to note that although Fury House won 6 of the 12 Inter-House Competitions, it failed to secure better than 3rd position in any of the other 6.

Fury started off with a rush by winning the first 3 Competitions—Cricket, Basketball and Debating. This gave them a lead of 11 points over Tempest and Sabre. However, a series of disasters followed, and after the 8th competition—Boxing—Tempest had a one point lead over both Fury and Sabre. Victory in the P.T. and Gymnastics Competition again put Fury in the lead, only to lose it again when Tempest won the Academics Competition. Thus at the end of the second term, with only the Drill and Athletics competitions left, Tempest had a lead of 3 points. The Drill Competition, however, proved a tragedy for Tempest for the judges unexpectedly placed them last instead of second. However, as it turned out, this possible error on the part of the judges did not affect the final result of the Championship for in Athletics Fury came first and Tempest last. Thus Fury ended with 68 points, Tempest 59, Sabre 58, and Attacker 55.



### FOUNDER'S DAY 1965

Founder's Day, 1965, was held on 27th February. As the term did not start until 10th February, and both the Inter-House Drill Competition and Athletics heats had to take place before the 27th, there was little time for rehearsals, especially as rain interfered on several days. This certainly left the athletes very short of practice.

The proceedings started with the arrival of the Guest of Honour—Air Commodore S.A. Yusaf, Assistant Chief of Air Staff (Training), at 2 p.m. After the band of the Ambala High School had played the National Anthem, the School Head Boy, Sikander Malik, obtained permission for the March Past, with Sabre House, winners of the Inter-House Championship the previous year, in the lead. The reward of an extra picture for the best senior and junior 'flight' was won in both cases by Tempest House.

After the March Past, the Aero-modelling Club gave a display of flying control-line models. This went off without any serious mishap and included 2 new items, namely bursting balloons with the models and flying 3 models together in the same circle so that they were chasing and overtaking one another. The boys who flew the models were Saeed Ahmed, Laiq Ahmed, Naeem Sheikh and Sohail Mallick.

The next item was the Gymnastics Display by a team of 11 boys, accompanied by P.T.I. Ali Sher. As in the previous year all exercises, including somersaults over the side box and long box, were performed without the support of the instructor, who himself formed one of the team. But this year all the boys performed the somersaults and not only a selected few. This speaks much not only for their skill but also their courage for some of the exercises are decidedly dangerous. But all went off without mishap and the gymnasts thoroughly deserved the applause which they received as they ran smartly off past the spectators.

A mass P.T. display by the whole School followed and, as in the previous year, it was one of the highlights of the day and was loudly applauded.

The athletics events then took place. Fury House, who had gained a substantial lead in the events decided earlier, won the Athletics cup by a big margin over Attacker, who came second. Feroze Hussain and Iqbal Habib were declared the best Senior and Junior Athletes respectively, with Hasnat Ahmed and Yasin the runners-up.

The remaining events consisted of the Old Boys' Race, won by Masoom, the Tug-of-War between the Old Boys and the Staff, the latter having no chance against twice their number on the other side, and finally the Obstacle Race for the Prefects, won by Iftikhar Malik.

The Principal then read out his report on the various achievements of the School in 1964, a year which saw new records in almost every important activity. An extract from his report is given below.

The Guest of Honour then awarded 'Wings' for Gliding to the 44 boys who had won them in the previous 12 months. He then presented the academic prizes and sports trophies. The much-coveted Chigwell Shield went to Fury, who had won the greatest number of points in the Inter-House Competitions held during the year.


The Guest of Honour then gave a very inspiring address. He congratulated the Staff and Boys on the School's outstanding achievements during the past year and he hoped they would keep it up. He remarked that he had that very morning been at the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, to select two Cadets for training at the R.A.F. College, Cranwell. The five Cadets from whom the selection was to be made were all Sargodha boys and they appeared such good material that he only wished that all five could have been selected instead of only two. He pointed out that while there was now no shortage of applications for the P.A.F., it was to the P.A.F. Schools that Air Headquarters looked to produce the best quality.

The last item on the programme was a sumptuous tea party, after which the guests departed. Nearly all the Old Boys, however, spent the night at the School. Next day the School played the Old Boys at Basketball, Hockey and Football. The Old Boys managed to draw the Football match but lost the other two.

# Extract From The Principal's Report, Founder's Day, 27th February, 1965

In all important aspects the past year has been the most successful in the history of the School. A far larger number of boys took and passed the Senior Cambridge Examination; considerably more boys joined the P.A.F. College, Risalpur than in any previous 12 months; our results at the I.S.S.B. and C.M.B. were far superior to anything achieved before; while a record number of boys gained their 'Wings' at Gliding.


The purpose of this School is to produce officer material for the flying branch of the P.A.F. During the past 12 months 29 of our boys joined the P.A.F. College, Risalpur, the previous best in any one year having been 21. As many as 22 boys joined the 42nd Course at Risalpur in August, 1964. This was half the total of the Course. Another 7 joined the 43rd Course in February, 1965. Nor has it been

a question of quantity only. Every one of the 29 boys who joined Risalpur in the last 2 courses had passed his Senior Cambridge Examination and completed his First Year F.Sc. That our boys are of a higher average educational standard than other entrants is clearly proved by the result of the test which was set by the Risalpur authorities when the 42nd Course joined. In this test our boys occupied not only the first 4 places but 15 of the first 19 places. And the superiority of Sargodhians was not limited to academics. This 42nd Course began flying in its first term and 4 of the 5 Cadets who went solo before the term ended were ours. Five Cadets are now under consideration for selection for training in the U. K. All are from this School. In fact, every Cadet who has been selected for training abroad in the last 2 years has been a Sargodhian. These facts speak for themselves.

A record number of 30 boys appeared for the 42nd G.D. (P) Course. Not one of these failed at the I.S.S.B., 26 passing and 4 being deferred. Of the 26 who passed the I.S.S.B. none was rejected by the C.M.B., 24 passing and 2 being deferred. These figures far exceed our previous best.

At the Passing Out of the 38th G.D. (P) Course at Risalpur in August, 1964, Sargodha boys won the Flying Trophy and Ground Subjects Trophy, besides occupying the first 4 places in order of merit. Of those who passed out nearly half were Sargodhians although Sargodhians formed only 1/4 of the Course at the start. Of the 10 Sargodhians who joined the 38th Course, 6 got their Wings at the Passing Out Parade, 2 are under training in the U.S.A., while 2 joined a ground branch. Thus not one was lost to the P.A.F. and 8 out of 10 got their Wings. This is a remarkable record considering that on an average not more than 1/3 of the Cadets who join Risalpur become pilots.

In academics, too, we had a record year. No fewer than 48 boys passed their Senior Cambridge Examination, our previous best having been 28. We continued to live up to our School Motto 'Aim High' by sending every Boy for the Senior Cambridge and none for the Matriculation—a thing which no other Public School dares do. That our policy is justified is shown by the superior educational standard of our boys at Risalpur. Incidentally a new School record of 12 points was set up in the last Senior Cambridge Examination by Jamal Hossain. who has also topped the 42nd G.D. (P) Course in all tests so far.

This has been our most successful year in Gliding too. Since last Founder's Day 44 boys have got their 'Wings'. Our previous best was 35 in 1963. For this the credit goes to Flt./Lt. Akbar and Sgt. Maqsood. Aero-modelling, too, has been particularly flourishing and more boys are now capable of flying control-line models than ever before.

In sports the Basketball Team won most of the honours. It did not lose a single match the whole year, and besides winning the C.T.I. Tournament, it beat Lower Topa, Hasanabdal Cadet College and the Military College, Jhelum. The other noteworthy effort was the winning of the West Pakistan Junior Swimming Championship. We lost none of the 8 matches we played at different games against Lower Topa. In the Athletic Sports new School records were established in the Senior and Junior Pole Vault by Meezan and Yasin respectively while Iqbal Habib beat the previous record in the Juniors Long Jump. A fact worth mentioning, perhaps, is that we have at last given up boxing, much to the relief of most boys and parents—to say nothing of the Housemasters who had considerable difficulty in persuading boys to enter the ring.





## Aero-Modelling







## AN UNFORGETTABLE INCIDENT

It was on Sunday, 28th February, the day after our Founder's Day, that I and five other juniors of Attacker House decided to raid an orange garden situated about half a mile from the School. Sunday is inclined to be a somewhat boring day and we felt the need of a little excitement. We could, of course, have bought all the oranges we wanted for a few annas but 'stolen fruit is always sweetest'. It was the spirit of adventure that inspired us and not the oranges. Incidentally the idea was by no means an original one. A party of senior boys of our House had made a successful raid on the same garden some two months earlier and we wanted to prove that what a senior can do a junior can do just as well.

We set out at about 8-15 p.m, carrying torches and a bag. At first we tried to reach our objective by going across country, the route the seniors had taken, but we lost our way and had to return. We then decided to go by the main road, a more risky route owing to the danger of encountering some member of the Staff.

We reached the garden without mishap and collected as many oranges as we could carry in the bag and in our pockets. We then returned to the road. But as luck would have it one of the garden chowkidars spotted us. Now when a chowkidar sees half a dozen boys emerge from an orange garden carrying a bag, he does not require a very high I.Q. to guess what they have been up to. He began to ask questions as to what was in the bag, whereupon N, who was carrying the bag, took to his heels and the rest of us followed suit. Finding that his acceleration was retarded by carrying the bag, N threw it away. The oranges no longer interested us. To escape was all that now mattered.

Now, I'm not much of a sprinter and I soon found myself lagging well behind. So I decided that my best chance of escape was to hide behind some bushes which were close to the road. Unfortunately I did not notice that there was a muddy ditch to be crossed before I could reach the bushes and next moment I found myself lying in it. I struggled to my feet, covered with mud, and tried to continue running. But I was shaken by my fall and tired out so I could make but slow progress.

Meanwhile my companions, realising that I was left behind, came to a halt. They shouted to me to run faster, but I called back that I could not. Very sportingly they came back to help me although they could easily have escaped. But by this time the chowkidar and some of his mates whom he had summoned came running up, and we were soon surrounded by an angry mob. We tried to bribe the chowkidars to let us go by offering to pay for the oranges and even more, but not being policemen they refused to agree. They said that some boys had been caught and let off previously and this time they were keeping us until the owner arrived.

The situation was looking very nasty when two senior boys chanced to come along on bicycles on their way from the P.A.F. cinema to the School. We called out to them to help us, but when they stopped the chowkidars took them to be two more of our gang. Fortunately some airmen from the nearly P.A.F. camp were present and they managed to convince the crowd that the two senior boys had nothing to do with the affair. We were so desperate by now that we asked these two boys to go to the Principal and request him to come and rescue us. We realised that we should certainly get punished pretty severely, but even that seemed preferable to the fate we were likely to meet with when the owner arrived. He might tell the chowkidars to thrash us or he might even have us taken to the lock-up.

We were made to sit on a bench by the roadside to wait for the owner. You can well imagine what a sorry lot we were now compared with the happy gang we were when we set out on the expedition. Our main anxiety now was—who would arrive first, the owner or the Principal?

We waited in suspense for what seemed like hours but was really a matter of some 20 minutes. Then to our immense relief we saw the Principal's car draw up. We were saved! After a bit of a discussion he persuaded the chowkidars to let us go, and we made our way sadly back to the School, minus the bag and torches which had been confiscated. It was a dismal ending to our adventure, and I need hardly say that we spent a very anxious night wondering what our fate would be.

The owner had contacted the Principal soon after we had left, and he agreed to leave it to the Principal to deal with us provided strict measures were taken to prevent further raids.

In the morning, when we were in class, the expected message arrived that we were to report to the Principal's office in the long break. We knew that there was little chance of being let off lightly as he had previously issued warnings against such raids; so we were fairly shivering with fright when we entered his office. After lecturing us on the seriousness of the offence, which brought a bad name to the School, he announced that we would be given six hours' Special Detention and stopped from seeing the monthly picture. Worse still, the punishment would be published in the weekly School Orders as a warning to others. But we could not help feeling that in his heart of hearts he did not really regard our expedition as anything more than an adventure such as any normal high-spirited boy might embark on. Probably he used to do the same sort of thing himself when he was at School. Who knows?
